AN INTERVIEW WITH DR GOUTAM BANDYOPADHYAY

Dr Goutam Bandyopadhyay is a cartographer in the department of Geological Sciences of Jadavpur University. He is in the departmental administration and works in the field of Geology, the Science of Earths, its strata and their relations. He has done PhD. in Geophysics, having completed Honours



in Geology from Jadavpur University. He also completed MSc in Applied Geophysics from the Q Your Hobby same university. Now he also teaches Japanese language in Sakura Academy and Atullya Ghosh field, reading and traveling. Institute.

Here are the excerpts from the interview:

and Atullya Ghosh Institute, from Geology to Japanese language..

A Actually once one of my friend of New Zealand told me how knowing Japanese language helps to earn money there. Then I began to take interest in this language. Then one day the Secretary to Dean, (Jadavpur University) also Faculty inspired me to learn this language. Gradually I grew an interest in Japanese language and then I talked with Dr Abhijit Mukherjee, professor of Engineering Department, Jadavpur Electrical University. He also inspired me and I took admission in Japanese course in the school of linguistics and languages of Jadavpur University. Abhijit Mukhejee is the head that Japanese language section.

Q You also teach Japanese in your house?

Yes I coach some students. Many of my students have settled in Japan -- one of my students from Sakura Academy named Rishav succeeded in J L PT -- N-1.

A Two of my classmates of Japanese language class told Bipul Krishna Das of Academy about me. Q You have gone to Japan for teacher's training

Yes in 2011 I went to Japan for teacher's Q Now you teach Japanese in Sakura Academy training for two months as a teacher of Sakura Academy

Q Your impression about Japan....

It was a memorable experience --I liked the Bullet train - it was mesmerising. I was especially charmed at how they have preserved old temples! How neat, punctual and dedicated Japanese people are! I also visited Hiroshima. I was really thrilled to think how japan has survived from the fatal destruction of cruel inhuman war!

Besides Japan you have also gone to other foreign countries?

A Yes I have also gone to Bangladesh, Nepal and England. I went to England twice ---in 1993 for PhD research and in 2000 for post - doctoral research.

Q Memorable experience....

A Aki Sensei came to learn Bengali in Jadavpur University! I had sweet memories of her ---a great friend! During our teacher's training in Japan I befriended many teachers of various countries and You are teacher -in-charge of Japanese we have formed a Facebook friend group!

Q Your advice to students....

Sakura A To learn kanji and grammar attentively. But the most vital thing is to go through the text properly.

that people often

feel lonely in their old age due to certain unsaid yet prevalent rules of the society. I want to find out more about such institutes during my stay here and someday in future I hope we see something like this in our country too.

After returning to India, I will indeed cherish my time and the people I have met here. This indeed is "Once in a lifetime encounter."


