AN INTERVIEW WITH MR ARJUN GUPTA



I asked Mr. Arjun Gupta: "What is your hobby?" He answered humbly: "Helping people" Probably this answer reveals his character. Arjun Gupta, is a sexagenarian with a charming personality. This composure has enabled him to face

the challenges in his life.

Born in Baidyabati, West Bengal, his forefathers hailed from Gosaibigha, a small village in Bihar, about 20 km from Rajgir. He later moved to Kolkata. He runs an NGO named "Himawari Seva Sangsthan in his ancestral village in Bihar. His wife Kiran Gupta is a Japanese language student in RKM, and through her we came to meet him.

Extracts of his interview:

Q: Your education:

A: My school education was in Bihar; graduated with Economics honours from Magadh University; and later got my M.A. Degree in Economics from Rabindra Bharati University in Kolkata.

Q: Then ...

A: I started to work in an export company, but due to the collapse of the Union of Soviet Socialist Republics, the company closed down, and I was suddenly without work.

Q: That period must have been troublesome for you...

A: Yes, it was. But fortune smiled on me. I had once befriended some Japanese tourists who stayed at my residence while in Kolkata. One of them asked "What's the matter? Why don't you go out to work?" I told him everything. He took copies of my academic qualifications, and due to his kindness I managed to get a job in a small company in Japan. I was associated with water treatment and sewerage connections - the only foreigner in the company with enormous responsibilities. I received a good remuneration, various facilities, worked for ten long years and applied for my permanent residency.

Then I wanted to do something different. I wanted to negotiate for the first phase testing of new medicines with Indian companies on behalf of Japanese companies. After a few negotiations this failed, I had no job, and I was in grave danger.

Q: Yes, the cruel question of survival....

A: That period was quite difficult. My family moved to our house I had bought in Kolkata, and I was almost finished financially.

Q: I think that was the time you started thinking about Yoga.

A: Actually I used to practise Yoga to keep fit. So I consulted with my family and went to Mumbai and then to Bangalore and acquired training in the Vivekananda Yoga University. I did a course on Ayurveda in Trivandrum. Then I went back to Japan.

Q: How did you manage to be associated with teaching Yoga in Japan?

A: I had to survive somehow. It wasn't easy. There had to be some connection, some promotion. Luckily I got a job as a welding mechanic till noon, after which I taught Yoga. It was exhausting! But I had to struggle. Now I have left the job and only teach Yoga in many places in Japan, in schools, colleges, clubs, gyms.... I teach even ladies 90 years old!

Q: Your NGO?

A: My NGO has separate representative for each village. A meeting and camp is held on the last Sunday of every month - the Secretary of Red Cross goes there on that day along with a general physician, gynaecologist and eye specialist to attend to the poor patients from those villages, and we try to provide medicines too though the NGO cannot give all the required medicines.

Q: You have lived in Japan so long, speak Japanese so well!

A: I have had no formal training in the language - I have learnt it through daily communication with the Japanese people.

Q: Your inspiration for starting this NGO?

A: I had seen many people wading through a river to go to work, some of whom stayed back at our house. My grandmother gave them bread and shelter for the night. This social service had an indelible impact on my mind. From my childhood I nurtured a dream of setting up a charitable institution in future.

Q: Japanese people in your eyes...

A: Very polite, honest, sincere and soft spoken. I like their humble behaviour and culture.

Q: Have you ever written anything?

A: Yes some articles on Yoga that have been published in magazines in Japan.

exploring the magical world of martial arts of Japan

The Consulate-General of Kolkata Japan collaboration with Indian Council of Cultural Relations in Kolkata organised an unique two-week exhibition for the first time in Kolkata titled "The Spirit of Budo - The History of Arts" Japan's Martial Rabindranath Tagore Centre, I.C.C.R. This exhibition took us on a tour of the history of the martial arts in Japan from battlefield technique international sport. The exhibition was inaugurated by

Mr. Mitsuo Kawaguchi, Consul General of Japan at Kolkata and Mrs. Rajashree Behera, Regional Director, I.C.C.R, Kolkata on 6th January, 2014. The President of I.C.C.R at New Delhi, Dr. Karan Singh also paid a kind visit to this exhibition.

The first half of the exhibition was a display of reproductions of historical weapons implements, such as sword mountings, bows, arrows, helmets, and suits of armour. The warriors of this period endured strenuous physical training with special emphasis on spiritual growth which transcended the narrow confines of warfare to the realm of discipline and service for others. Special attraction of this series was eight superbly designed helmets, the originals of which were actually worn in battle by renowned warlords such as Nagamasa Kuroda (1568-1623) and Yukimura Sanada (1567-1615).

The second half of the exhibition focuses on the contemporary practice of the martial arts. Away from the war zone, the equipment and clothing were developed to prevent injury during training. Bamboo swords, protectors, gloves, and Hakama pants are on display, along with descriptive panels and a DVD presentation of practice scenes. Kids could also wear Karate-do costumes and really enjoyed it! The overwhelming response from the people of Kolkata especially martial artists, students and artists of Kolkata made it a resounding success for which Consulate is really thankful.
