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AN INTERVIEW WITH MAHASHVETA BASU MUKHERJEE

Mahashveta san is a Japanese language teacher in IJWCA She is a regular performer in our Japanese drama in In Nichi Bunkasai . Once a student was not able to attend a rehearsal and later she could not continue due to some personal problem. We approached Mahashveta san and when she came for the first rehearsal she rehearsed the scene without looking at the script. What a dedication!



We had a chat about her passion for Japanese language, hobby, her various work experiences.

Excerpts from the interview:

Q We know you have written many excellent Haiku ---

A Yes, I learnt about Haiku from Kazuko Nigam Sensei. Sensei taught me the -5/7/5 pattern I love it very much. A picture created by using only 5/7/5 letters. Sensei always has inspired me writing Haiku My Haikus have been published in various magazines.

Q Yes. We have heard that your Haiku has been published in Japan. One was also published in Asahi Shinbun newspaper in Japan.

A Yes, that was the one of the most memorable moments of my life. Once I recited a Haiku on the stage. I met the renowned Haiku poet Emiko Miyashita.

Q You have also translated?

A Yes I have translated some short stories into Japanese language.

Q Your major was?

A I completed my M.A. degree in Political Science For unavoidable circumstances I could not continue my PhD.

Q You also worked in various fields.

A Yes I worked as a T V announcer. I worked in a Market Research Company and also as a translator --- to translate from Hindi & Bengali to English.

Q Besides Japanese you also know Hindi and Urdu.

A:: I did a Diploma course in Hindi and learned some Urdu language also.

A Actually when I started to learn Japanese I did not have any particular thought or passion. Then my mother advised me to be engaged with something like learning any foreign language. My mother is very fond of Japan so she suggested Japanese language. At that time my knowledge of Japan was Tagore's book - "Japan Yatri" and some Japanese words like Kimono, Ikebana, Bonsai, Sayoonara etc, and about some historical events.

Q Your first teacher was Kazuko Nigam Sensei?

A Yes I still remember the first day (6 th of July - my birthday also) of Japanese language class. Our teacher was Nigam Sensei. At first Sensei wrote her name on the black board and the first Japanese words –"Arigatoo Gozaimasu. On that very day I fell in love with Japanese language.

Q You are an executive member of NKKS – Nihongo Kaiwa Kyookai Society?

A Yes through the learning of Japanese Language I came to know NKKS and I began to take part in its various activities like quiz, song and drama. I have participated Japanese drama many times. I never imagined that I could perform on the stage but with the inspiration of Nigam Sensei I started to act.

Q You also participated in Japanese language speech contest?

A Yes but I never got any rank.

Q Your teaching experience

A Now I teach Japanese language in Indo Japan Welfare and Cultural Association basic Japanese and JLPT oriented crash course I am very grateful to Dr D N Bakshi –he was the person who gave me this opportunity. Whatever reputation and respect I have as a Japanese language teacher is due to his kindness. I also feel very lucky that I have learnt Japanese language and I have found a teacher like Nigam Sensei. I am also very much proud of my institution IJWCA.

Q Your hobby?

A I like to watch all kinds of movies and listening to music I also love to read books --- doing sketch and painting.

My Experience in Japanese Language Teachers Training



I have recently completed Japanese Language Teachers Training Course A (360 Hrs) conducted by The Ministry of External Affairs of India and Embassy of Japan in India under India-Japan Memorandum of Cooperation in the field of Japanese Language Education in India with the support of The Japan Foundation, MHRD, MSDE, UGC from 23rd July 2018 to 12th October 2018 at UGC - Human Resource Development Centre Jawaharlal Nehru University.

While applying I knew if got selected I have to stay at JNU hostel for entire duration of the course. Staying away from my family for 12 weeks was really tough decision to make. I did not have any experience of hostel life. I faced difficulty to adjust initially but my classmates helped me a lot in the new environment. We used to go for a walk in the evening during weekends to explore JNU campus.

As I don't have any teaching experience, our faculties put extra effort on me to make me efficient in teaching methodology which put emphasis on interesting activities i.e poster making, kamishibai etc and verbal communication. We got opportunity to observe Japanese classes in JNU, DU and The Japan Foundation. We took couple of mock classes for students of JNU and The Japan Foundation. As a language teacher not only teaching Japanese language but also teaching culture of Japan is essential for the students. We have learned how to wear yukata by our self within a time limit which would help me while teaching Japanese culture. In Japanese culture, office manners are very important. We have learned how to teach students Japanese office manners.

I am sincerely obliged to The Ministry of External Affairs of India and Embassy of Japan in India for selecting me for this course which will enable me to pursue my career as Japanese language teacher.


