SMARAN BASU (Ishan), now 2nd year student in South City College, Kolkata pursuing English Honours course recently returned from a Japan tour. He was a member of the Indian students group that went to Japan for participating in the 18th Japan-India Students' Conference. Smaran san is the son of Reema Basu who has been teaching Japanese Language for a long time. Naturally Smaran san has an ambience of Japanese Language Learning at home though he is not a regular student of Japanese Language but has interest in it. So when he got the chance to visit Japan as a student he was very elated and excited. Here we have an interaction with him about his recent experience.

Q: You went to Japan...

A: Yes, I wanted to experience the culture and values of Japan as well as participating in the 18th Japan-India Student Conference.

Q: Your experience......

A: I was simply excited to visit Japan and enjoyed each and every moment of it. My view point was that of a tourist, but after landing and experiencing Japan first hand I understood the true spirit of Japan.

Q: You seem very excited......

A: Yes after returning to India I was almost shellshocked by everything. I had got used to the softspoken and good-natured Japanese people. I had forgotten how to cross the roads here in Kolkata by waving to and fro in between the traffic. Crossing roads in Japan was as easy as crossing can be. People wait for the signal to turn on and as by some magic all cars stop so that people can cross the road.

Q: So you think Indian habits differ.....

A: I love my country very much. But we must change some habits. Here I miss the clean roads, trains, buses, sometimes we spit on the road, throw garbage and travelling in buses or trains compared with Japan haunts me in my sleep because in Japan the passengers care to follow the rules and are so cordial even in the rush hours. But here we often experience differently. I am not criticizing my country but we should learn cleanliness, caring for others and punctuality from the Japanese people, Both India and Japan are great countries and both have a great heritage and culture. We can exchange so many good things. Through this short tour sometimes I was amazed by their discipline, dedication and sweet behaviour. If I ever get a chance to go to Japan again I will readily grab it.


